



BURFORD TOWN COUNCIL

Time for a change.....



On 5 May we have the local elections for both the district councillor for Burford, Fulbrook and Taynton, and Burford Town Council. After 16 years of service to us, Derek Cotterill is standing down as our district councillor, so we will elect a new councillor to serve us. Also, a few of the town councillors are stepping down, so there are changes afoot. I hope most of

you will exercise your democratic right and vote in the two elections. Polling for both councils for Burford residents will take place at the Warwick Hall, Burford from 7.00am to 10.00pm on Thursday 5 May, or by postal vote if you have applied for that. It would be good to have a fully elected town council with as many electors voting as possible. This time there are 13 candidates for the 11 seats.

I must say "thank you" to Derek for his support of Burford town and the town council as our councillor at WODC for so many years; he will be sorely missed. I can only hope we will elect a district councillor who really understands and looks after our local interests as effectively as Derek has done, as Burford is such a unique and special community in West Oxfordshire.

Your new council will start their term with the Jubilee celebrations followed closely by the Burford Festival. In addition, they will have to take on the appeal which has now been lodged for planning on Cole's Field, and longer term, work on an HGV strategy for the area with OCC to protect the town, and plan improvements to the recreation ground and play area.

The council has now planted our Jubilee Oak Tree on the triangle of land to the east of Shilton Road. It should outlive us all.

We are now "living with Covid' according to the government. It seems Covid listened and has made the most of this. Cases here are higher than ever, as I can personally vouch for! We can only hope it burns itself out with the wonderful theory of "herd immunity" that was mentioned in the early days of Covid. Time will tell.

I hope many of you will have attended the annual Town Meeting at the Warwick Hall to ask questions and raise suggestions to the town council. It is the best chance we have of listening to you all so that we can try to improve the town as you wish. As a council, we do have limited powers, but we can also carry some weight with both WODC and OCC in lobbying for changes. The improvement of the western High Street pavement is a good example of this.

This may be my last offering as Mayor. If so, thanks for reading; if not, see you all in the June edition. Peter Higgs - Mayor

After 16 years I have met many people and worked with many more but I don't know the names or addresses of a



DISTRICT COUNCIL ELECTIONS

We invited the three candidates for the Burford Ward to answer a series of questions about themselves and local issues. Their responses are below:

HUGO ASHTON –

Liberal Democrat Candidate

My Burford connections

My connections with Burford began in 1974 when I first visited the house where Sue had lived all her life (now called Wysdom Hall). We were married in Burford's Quaker Meeting House in 1979, and have been frequent visitors with our children since then to my parents-in-law,

Ruth and Roger Warner. We have lived permanently in Burford since 2009.

My involvement with local activities

I became closely involved with the local community by chairing the Burford Festival from 2012 to 2019. Our hardworking committee increased the Festival's profile each year (2013, 2015, 2017, 2019) and it has become a major community event with up to 150 volunteers from the local area involved in some way. It has also supported local projects financially, including our library, local schools, tree-planting, the Burford Archive, traffic calming measures and the Tolsey Museum. I have retired from the organising committee and am now a Trustee of the Burford Festival registered charity. I am delighted to see the great programme the new committee has produced!

As a transport planner and economist by background I have helped Burford Town Council on transport matters relating to the Coles Field development and the HGV Weight Limit. In Objection to the previous Coles Field application I submitted evidence of the impact on Witney Street (traffic) and Barns Lane (traffic and pedestrian conflict) and spoke at the Inquiry. The current application uses Frethern Close as a main access point and I submitted a technical paper on this subject to the WODC planning committee, and will do so at the appeal.

On the HGV Weight Limit, I supported BTC on technical matters at the outset of the campaign to get the ban implemented. In preparation for the final decision hearing, I helped prepare a technical paper using the data collected by OCC, and presented to the OCC decision maker, Scrutiny Panel and Cabinet on the current fight to rescue something from the failure of the scheme to meet its specific targets.

I have strongly supported Windrush Against Sewage Pollution by providing a speaking platform at the Burford Festival and through significant donations from Festival funds raised.

Sue and I have been involved with the Burford Archive project from the outset, and continue to support it, including by raising funds through private garden tours of our own and other Burford gardens.

My top priorities

My top two priorities would be to strongly fight the Coles Field development (again!) and to work with other District Councillors and OCC to develop a workable HGV weight limit scheme with proper enforcement in Burford and the surrounding area.

Engagement with people in the Ward

I live in the heart of Burford and am therefore easily accessible at home. My mobile phone number and email are publicly available and all residents would be welcome to contact me with their issues or views (at any reasonable time of day!)

I would attend Town and Parish Council meetings in Burford, Fulbrook and Taynton to understand emerging issues and report back on District matters. I would continue Derek's regular column in The Bridge and other parish newsletters.

When there is a substantive issue to address, such as parking, I would form a temporary group through which to engage and consult with local residents and businesses.

Action on holiday homes and lets

This is tricky. The beauty of our area naturally attracts second home owners, many of whom are involved in our community, living in their property year-round, if part-time. This risks villages becoming lifeless during the week and overrun at weekends, but I suspect we have less of a seasonal problem than Wales or Cornwall.

The problem arises with holiday lets. They can add to the local economy, but too often displace permanent residents and import parking problems and disruptive behaviour. I think the short-term letting model needs to be more tightly regulated to protect established B&B and hotel operators who must meet higher health and safety standards.

Wales enjoys delegated authority on second home taxation, and Cornwall is seeking similar powers. WODC doesn't have such tools, but at the margin planning permissions may be able to stipulate constraints on use. I shall find out more if elected!

CRAIG BROWN

Conservative Candidate



Where do you live and what connections do you have with Burford, Fulbrook and Taynton?

I have lived in West Oxfordshire for 40 years. I have long admired the beauty and unique qualities of the area, I think that Bulford, Fulbrook and Taynton stand out in particular because the

characters of each location have remained largely untouched.

What is, or has been, your involvement with this area, eg charities, societies or other initiatives? None at present, but looking to get as much involved in local

organisations as I can over the next couple of months; this will include working with families and the PTAs to improve community play and recreation areas. If I am fortunate enough to be elected no councillor will work harder than me to protect and implement the interests of the Burford, Fulbrook and Taynton ward.

What would be your top priority if you were elected? Campaigning against the lifting of the HGV ban and seeking to sort out car parking for the town.

If you were elected, how would you engage with voters in the ward to obtain their views on council matters? If elected in May my intention is to hold regular surgeries where I will be available to spend time listening to the concerns of residents and advise them as best I can, and of course I can always be contacted via email. I will of course be spending lots of time knocking on doors and talking to the people.

Do you think any action needs to be taken over the number of holiday homes and holiday lets in this area and, if so, what? It is a shame to lose local housing to holiday lets, so that local people lose the ability to live in the places that they grew up. I believe that local families come first and that they should be allowed to live close to friends and family as this builds a strong community. Some holiday lets should be permitted to help build and protect a strong local economy, however I am of the firm opinion that the amount of holiday homes and lets should be closely monitored.

Labour Candidate



Where do you live and what connections do you have with Burford, Fulbrook and Taynton?

Just outside Burford by the Wildlife Park with my family, where I work from home for an environmental charity. I work part-time at the Coop (you may know me as the Coop guy) in Burford. I go to Church in Burford and am a

member of the Burford Environment Action Group. Also enjoy taste-testing ciders at Burford's many pubs!

What is, or has been, your involvement with this area, eg charities, societies or other initiatives?

I submitted a report to Burford Town Council about their use of pesticides (that can harm nature). At a council meeting about this, I met the Burford Environment Action Group, and have been a member since. I have enjoyed helping the group, including acting as a steward at Burford's first repair café (keenly urging people on the street to come and visit the café). I volunteered with Good Food Oxfordshire and supported its work on local food, ensuring it included West Oxfordshire and local farmers.

I am the Rural Affairs Coordinator for the West Oxfordshire Labour Party, and ensure rural communities, the countryside, and farmers are considered. I also stand up for Burford there, especially championing the HGV limit.

What would be your top priority if you were elected?

A sustainable future for Burford and the district. We need a long-term transport plan which reduces car usage for Burford, perhaps using West Oxfordshire Community Transport to connect Burford with surrounding villages and improve cycle paths. We should host a Burford Climate Summit so you get a say on how we can lower emissions, and need stronger action on empty homes.

How is it in 2022...

That an elderly and disabled person living alone in a village near Burford is cut off because of a lack of public transport? That a family wanting to lower their emissions or fuel bill, cannot safely cycle from a neighbouring village into Burford? That a young man works two jobs in Burford, but must travel 40 minutes a day from Oxford to serve the town's economy, and wait endlessly for a council house?

That key local businesses in some cases have barely 50% of the staff they need and have staff on sick leave due to the stress of this?

That our farmers in the district face the loss of over £6million by 2028 from government subsidy reductions, but there is no local action for them?

These questions arise from what people have told me and my first-hand experience. Burford is an amazing place to live, and these questions do not arise because you lack care or generosity. The cause is a disjointed and failed approach to local issues. The same type of councillor is elected: unwilling or unable to give an active voice to the whole community and lacking energy or imagination to give Burford a sustainable future.

If you were elected, how would you engage with voters in the ward to obtain their views on council matters?

1. I would hold bi-monthly 'Chats with the Councillor': anyone local could come for a chat with me (possibly in Warwick Hall over coffee). 2. I would like a good internet presence - allowing you not just to email but also contact me through Facebook. Finally, I would maintain a casual presence in the ward (going for coffee or a pint) and try and stay on at the Coop, a great place to engage with the community.

Do you think any action needs to be taken over the number of holiday homes and holiday lets in this area and, if so, what?

I want STRONGER ACTION on empty homes. In the Burford Ward there are 141 empty houses, while 2,839 people are on the district council house waiting list! We don't want more housing developments which destroy our landscape, but local businesses are under huge pressure from staff shortages. At the Coop I see job vacancies which may receive 0 applicants and staff quit because of problems travelling (especially during a cost-of-living crisis). Local people who are willing to work in Burford are excluded from living here. We need to:

Fund stronger enforcement of the Empty Homes Strategy. More immediate use of Empty Dwelling Management Orders (which allows houses that are empty for more than 2 years to be rented out by the council) and 100% premium council tax on houses empty for longer than 6 months (West Oxfordshire has 656 such houses).

Potential creation of a Burford Local Housing Platform to support local businesses and people find affordable accommodation in the area for staff.

OCC COUNCILLOR REPORT

A Year Of Turbulence

A great deal has happened since the elections last May.

A new Liberal-Labour-Green alliance took over from the previous Conservative administration and has made several significant policy decisions which have affected the residents of Burford. They revoked the Burford HGV ban which had proven to work successfully in Burford and had showed no increase in the outlying villages as HGVs tend to use the A40, A34 and M40. It was revoked as the Lib Dem-Labour administration believed Burford had selfishly financed the ban which then adversely affected outlying areas and the new administration wanted to outline a county-wide policy and felt that the Burford decision had been too unilateral, although I and Burford Town Council have supplied ample evidence that the Burford ban not only worked but also benefitted the surrounding areas. However, not all is lost, we will now re-file for an 18 ton limit experimental traffic regulation order (rather than the current 7.5 ton limit). We will continue to fight for a ban as we do not want to see long traffic queues re-emerge in Burford, together with further air pollution. We need to protect our historic town. This is not the end of the road – please watch this space.

The Liberal-Labour alliance also implemented a 5% increase in council tax (compared to the Conservative administration's proposed 3.5%) at a time when everyone's pockets were hit by rising prices and taxes. We have seen significant increases in energy prices: electricity doubling from 14p per kWh to 28.5 per kWh, heating oil increasing from 50p per litre to £1 per litre and petrol prices leaping from £1.30p to £1.60 per litre. This has significantly hit those on a fixed income and has left many people struggling and having to decide between spending money on heating or eating. This was not a time to increase council tax to 5%.

Furthermore this new Lib Dem-Labour-Green administration wastes so much time on non-county issues. The first motion that was proposed was to change the name of chairman to chair or chairperson. This was followed by a motion advocating that only plant-based food should be served at county council-held functions at a time when our famers and local producers need every support. Furthermore, they continue to serve melon, strawberries, grapes and other produce from Morocco, Spain and other far-away countries – hardly supporting local producers. Veganism is a personal choice that should be respected but this attempt to dictate the diet of others is totally unacceptable. Our local farmers staged a protest at the February full council meeting and this gained more coverage from the media than the OCC Budget. Even Jeremy Clarkson complained.

The last council meeting was a debate on how to treat binary and non-binary people and to install non-gender lavatories in all 600 council buildings – including eventually the county schools. This would cost hundreds of thousand pounds placing even more strain on the county's budget.

It is not surprising that the national press have asked: **is this (OCC) the daftest council in Britain?** It would seem that this administration and its wokeism is focusing more on woke cultural warfare than on addressing the needs of its residents.

The other major issue affecting our area, is the state of our rivers and in particular the Windrush. Thames Water continues to discharge raw sewage into the Windrush. In conjunction with WASP (Windrush Against Sewage Pollution), we now have equipment which measures pollution in the river and this was funded partly by Burford residents and OCC funding. We will continue to fight for clean rivers and push for legislation to ban raw sewage being dumped into our rivers.

Not only has this year been difficult economically, but we have also seen a rebound and rise in COVID and the war in Ukraine which has had a major impact on all of us. COVID has placed a significant pressure on our hospitals and social care. Unfortunately the virus (and its variants) is still with us and may well remain with us over the coming years.

Proposals For 20MPH Speed Limit Across Oxfordshire Wallingford central has become the third 20mph pilot

Wallingford central has become the third 20mph pilot scheme to be unveiled in Oxfordshire.

OCC completed the work earlier this month as part of its £8m plans to reduce the speed of the majority of the county's 30mph roads to 20mph where suitable and when supported by local residents. I have asked for clarity about how the success/failure of these pilot schemes will be measured. In particular, I have asked if speed surveys are being undertaken before and after their introduction. It must be remembered that compliance by motorists is

effectively voluntary as it will not be enforced by the police. It will be interesting to see how effective it will be without any enforcement.

Burford and Swinbrook already have 20mph limits and Brize Norton and Taynton have also requested to join the pilot scheme.

AS I WAS SAYING.....



I am writing this during Lent, a time when those of a religious bent, and others, traditionally give something up. The theological validity of such abstinence is doubtful as the giver-up usually gives something up which benefits him/her – alcohol, chocolate or supporting Manchester United – rather than doing good for

others. Modern thinking is coming round to the view that doing something positive is just as worthy as giving up. Not wishing to be left behind, I decided to do something positive.

I decided to make a list of the people I want to shoot. Top of the list is the person, probably a public relations gonk, who advises giant institutions, utility companies, government agencies (especially the DVLA – see recent press comment), chain stores, couriers and so forth on the offensive use of the half-truth. It is obviously only one person because all those organisations respond to every query, complaint or mild enquiry about the whereabouts of the goods or service you ordered three months ago in exactly the same manner. Something like:-

"Your phone call/email/letter is important to us. However, we are currently experiencing unprecedented levels of calls/emails/letters and all our staff have Covid so please be patient."

It is easy to sort the wheat from the chaff. They don't actually give two hoots about your missive (a lie), they are receiving more communications than usual (a truth) but that is substantially due to their total incompetence rather than just the pandemic (which is the lying implication) and failure to hire enough staff to cover the odd absence which may be due to Covid. What they really mean is:-

"We don't give a damn about your problem. We have enough to do without worrying about you moaning whingers. We are all working from home and don't take kindly to being woken up."

The government has a lot to answer for in this respect. It started the weaponisation of the half-truth and continues to do so. Whenever the issue of underfunding is raised, be it the NHS, the hospitality industry, farming or the process of getting Ukrainian refugees into second homes in St Ives, the government always responds by saying what it has actually spent on these causes which is never the amount really required. It never tells the complete truth which is that it has allocated as much as it is going to and that the country cannot afford to borrow any more.

Who next to prop against the wall? I am running out of space so will propose only one more category – those manufacturers and producers who, instead of increasing their prices, reduce the size or quantity of what they sell or the quality thereof without telling us, the customers! One of the most notorious exponents of this cruel trick was Gordon's Gin. The strength of gin, or any alcoholic drink for that matter, is indicated by its ABV (alcohol by volume). Towards the end of the last century, Gordons reduced the strength i.e. quality of its standard gin from 40% to 37.5% making it undrinkable in the eyes, or rather mouths, of experienced tipplers. They did not announce the change nor lower the price. Inevitably they were found out and lost swathes of customers. That has not stopped many others over the years trying it on –

Toblerone removed a peak, Kleenex lowered the average number of tissues per box and Weetabix bars have been shrinking like newly washed shirts.

I must add one more – those fiends who photoshop a photograph of a famous statue and superimpose the rather imposing features of an innocent bystander. I am speechless!

Without Carl Linnaeus, many aspects of the modern world would be poorer. Of his many innovations, the establishment of the binomial system is considered the greatest – thus, we humans are known as *Homo sapiens* or the common lawn daisy as *Bellis perennis*; this scientific *lingua franca* has enabled communication across the centuries and between societies. Linnaeus's legacy was far wider than this, he was the first person in Europe to flower and fruit a banana and he developed a technique for growing seed pearls. His plant collection (herbarium or *hortus siccus*), library and archives are now housed at the Linnean Society of London and attest to his achievements.

Mark, studied horticulture at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew and botany and mycology at university. After 12 years as a senior botany curator at the Natural History Museum, London he is now a consultant forensic botanist, public speaker and occasional radio and TV presenter. He is the honorary curator of Carl Linnaeus's herbarium at the Linnean Society of London, one of the most significant collections in the history of science.

A Cotswold Mill Lade by R. Kirkland Jamieson



A new exhibit at the Museum is this oil painting, measuring approx. 30 x 25 ins, (63 x 76 cm) which shows a view from a bygone age, having been painted circa 1925-1930, when the Mill Leet at Widford still had water in it.

The painting has been deposited with BTMA by a gentleman from Manchester who wanted it to be near where it was created.


The artist was born at Lanark. Scotland which explains his native use of the word Lade for the more commonly used word Leet in describing the headwater for a mill.

Kirkland Jamieson (1881-1950) was head of the Westminster School of Art for much of the 1930s and became principal of St Martin's School of Art in 1945, whilst exhibiting widely in watercolour and oil, some of which are held in collections at Oldham, Worthing, Belfast, Glasgow and now Burford.

Jamieson was one of the artists involved in Recording Britain, a scheme established by Sir Kenneth Clark alongside the official War Artists' Scheme to document the British landscape in the face of the imminent threat of bomb damage, invasion, and loss caused by the operations of war, and the decline of rural ways and of life and industries. Some 1500 works were produced by 97 artists, including Burford Grammar School's own teaching artist, Alban Atkins, the Tithe Barn at Great Coxwell being one of his subjects.

In an online biography of the artist, Jamieson is said to have lived in Burford, and I wonder if any older residents remember him, or his wife the artist and potter, Dorothea Selous (1881-1968).

SWIFT RETURN



The first week of May I am so glad to see the swifts back. In the lighter evenings you can see and hear them screaming across the sky in groups, high up, then diving down at impossibly high speeds into almost invisible nesting holes between the roof tiles. They migrate to southern Africa every year, staying with us

only until the end of July, but miraculously return without fail on nearly the same day each year.

Swifts are on the decline, with a 51% decrease in UK breeding numbers seen between 1995 and 2015. This is mainly as a result of loss of nesting holes under roofs and eaves, brought about when old houses undergo renovation and are given new roofs, with tight fitting tiles, and no gaps remain. Nesting swifts come back to the same site year after year, and like to nest together, so return from migration to find nests blocked up or lost. They are insect eaters, and use of pesticides and loss of insect habitat has also taken its toll. The RSPB has launched a national swift mapping survey, and is encouraging all of us to add our swift sightings and known nests to the database, so that swifts and nesting sites can be mapped, and hopefully support conservation efforts.



The loss of habitat can be remedied if we all become more aware. If you are thinking about re-tiling your stone roof, plan ahead, either by identifying existing nest sites, and making sure you leave and recreate nest spaces in the same position when you re-roof, or by proactively providing new nesting sites to encourage new birds when you rebuild. RSPB and other groups sell prefabricated nesting boxes suitable for under roof tiling, or eaves, or 'swift bricks' that can be easily added into walls. You can ask the roofing contractor to make sure suitable spaces are created bespoke. You can even get a swift sound CD to attract birds to your site! Local roofers and building contractors can also be encouraged more to consider swifts in their work and make sure nesting holes are left in buildings they work on.

Perhaps Burford and surrounds could become a 'swift town' to celebrate and protect these iconic symbols of summer. Oxford has become one of the world's first 'Swift Cities' and is making real progress in working with contractors and householders to create and protect nest sites. Other examples locally are St Joseph's Catholic Church in Carterton where sensitive re-roofing has supported over 20 pairs of swifts to return annually, and Shilton village holds annual 'swift walks' encouraging greater awareness of this wonderful bird - coinciding with national 'swift awareness week' this year on 2-10 July 2022. Temporary suspension of operations

After 14 great and trouble free years of helping the community to save a total of around £250,000 in their heating costs, we regret to inform you that our committee has had to

temporarily suspend the operation of the Burford Oil Syndicate. This is due to the highly volatile price and supply of heating oil caused by the recent geopolitical uncertainty that shows no sign of improving in the foreseeable future.

For the first time ever in March, the syndicate was unable to place a bulk order with all but one supplier, who was willing to supply, but at a price of £1.299 a litre. At that time our members were able to order direct from other companies at prices between 93p and £1.03 a litre. At the time of writing, many suppliers are only prepared to advise individual customers the price on the day of delivery.

We will review the market regularly, and when stable conditions return that will enable us to offer our members a cost advantage, we will resume operations. In the meantime, I would like to thank Peter Higgs on our members' behalf, not only for the superb work he does throughout the year as the syndicate's administrator but also for the added workload that he has incurred in assisting our members due to the market turmoil.

2022 AGM

Following the success of the past two virtual AGMs and the continued presence of Covid in the community, the 2022 AGM will once again follow the same format.

On or before 13 May our members will be emailed or posted the papers that need to be considered at our AGM. Where required, the items will already have been proposed and seconded, by the names shown.

ALICE'S BOOK GROUP

The Book Group always enjoy Nicola Cornick's work, and *The Last Daughter* was no exception. Her books are fun to read as she weaves real local places and events into her mystery murder stories. As one said: "It's like sitting down to eat a favourite meal, you know it is going to be enjoyable." That is not to say that they are all the same. This story centres around Minster Lovell, though there is a flying visit to Burford, and a brief appearance of a character we have met in a previous story. As with others we have read, this story involves time travel, or at least, related events in different centuries. Some of the threads through the ages were a little difficult to follow, and more than one found themselves trying to work out their

sequence and the relationships between the

characters.

It is always easy to read Nicola's stories, one is very seldom brought up short by a clumsy sentence, or a careless piece of editing, and there is no doubt that although she knows the settings of her books intimately, and describes them beautifully, it is obvious too, that she also does a great deal of research. This story touches on Richard III and the Princes in the Tower, on which it seems most of us are experts or have strong opinions, but our sensibilities were not disturbed – much. She also cleverly wove into the narrative the Mistletoe Bride and put a new interpretation on the body found inside Minster Lovell Hall, presumed to be the unfortunate Francis Lovell, both of which added a nice sense of familiarity.

The baddies are suitably bad, the goodies suitably good, and naturally, there is a love story too. As both the lovers were portrayed as attractive, nice, people, we found it all very satisfactory. It will be interesting to hear the author at Burford Festival discussing this very story.

A book that we all enjoyed seldom leads to much discussion, but the choice for the next one did. Several of us had heard a Radio 4 book programme where the participants, two women and a man, had read and were reviewing *Treasure Island* by Robert Louis Stevenson and the idea of a classic, nominally a children's classic, was mooted. It was a toss up between *Gulliver's Travels* and *Treasure Island*, and the latter was chosen, possibly because the women on the radio liked this ripping boys' yarn; oddly the man was less enthusiastic. We may eventually read *Gulliver's Travels*, but at present a political satire might be too apt. *Veral Marshall*
