From Inside the Tolsey



Planning

November will be the month for considering the HELAA etc as published by WODC early in the month. The HELAA is the current name for predecessor SHLAA and SHELAAs as it covers the sites WODC consider suitable for development from the more extensive list submitted by landowners.

Election

Next year, 2026, is election year for Burford Town Council when all councillors willing to stand offer themselves for reelection. Several councillors will stand down so this is the opportunity for those wishing to serve their community, and keep this vibrant town running smoothly, to step forward.

Flooding

Will it be a dry winter or a very wet one? No-one knows but now is the time for riparian landowners to ensure that the rivers, mill stream and spillways are free from debris, vegetation, fallen trees and other obstructions. The Environment Agency (EA) has designated the Burford Mill Stream as "main river" because it is a significant part of the flood defences for Burford and the River Windrush. (EA Main Rivers and Flood Maps are on-line.) We have approximately 15 properties at risk from flooding in Burford.

Coaches

Work continues to find a solution to the issue of coaches overcrowding Priory Lane. The favoured solution is still for a drop off/pick up point in town and a lay over area away from the centre. Studies are underway to find a suitable location where coaches can turn and park safely. The normal traffic congestion caused by a listed 1322 single carriageway medieval bridge will always remain a headache. A traffic meeting at the end of the month between all decision makers, town, county, police, tourism and district councils will, hopefully, be a productive step forward.

Events

The period up to Christmas heralds many social events, switching on Christmas lights, Civic Carol Service and Reception, etc, etc, So watch the pages of The Bridge for more details of dates and times. These occasions will be great opportunities to meet councillors and others so that those interested in taking the town forwards for the next four years can discuss ideas and issues.



Burford's Wartime Stories

We left this place in a great hurry on October 30th and travelled all night and went in the trenches at nine o'clock the next morning and were under fire almost all of the time till Tuesday. On Sunday November 1st our captain (Captain Molloy) was killed. Since then we have been in the trenches on three other occasions and there have been five killed and about 15 wounded. When we went into the trenches on November 15th it rained hard and we all got wet through, and the trenches were ankle deep in mud.

This matter-of-fact account came from Percy Batchelor, a former pupil of Burford Grammar School, and was published in the winter 1914 edition of the school magazine. He was serving in the Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars, the first Yeomanry unit to go overseas, landing in France on 22 September 1914 within weeks of the outbreak of the First World War. Percy survived the war, returned to Oxfordshire and died in 1985 aged 90.

His account appears in a new book from the Tolsey Press, *Burford's Wartime Stories*, a successor to last year's *Treasures of the Burford Tolsey Museum*. That book recounted local history by reference to objects in the museum's collection whereas the new volume, compiled by Peter Martin, to a large part does so in the words of local people. After beginning with brief references to the Crimean and Second Boer Wars, it covers the two World Wars in the last century in much more detail.

At this time of year our thoughts turn to those like Percy who fought for their country and came home and to those who did not and whose names are recorded on the memorials in our various communities. However, unlike the case in earlier conflicts, the two World Wars had a huge impact on those at home, especially the second one. The book contains a wealth of memories taken from the diaries, letters and other documents showing how everyone pulled together in many ways. There is a cast list of those mentioned running from Adams (Sybil) to Vick (Baden). One of the first effects of the war in 1939 was an influx of evacuees from London and other built-up areas, greatly increasing the local population. Joanna Turner says that her father, Bill Piercy, bought the Great House as a "country cottage" in 1933. The family moved there when the war broke out and spent the next six years there together with other members of their extended families

and some government evacuees placed there by Lady Southby, the billeting officer. Her father recalled sitting down to supper with 17 women.

Food and clothing were rationed and food distribution was organised by a committee led by Mr A E Pether, who was also chairman of the parish council. Many people kept chickens, rabbits and even pigs in their gardens. There was much improvisation in respect of clothing and makeup, with "make do and mend" being the order of the day.

Women were heavily involved in the war effort, notably through the Women's Land Army whose members replaced farm workers serving in the military and helped maintain vital food supplies. But women took on many other roles. There is a fascinating account by Diana Barraclough of how she was recruited into what became Bletchley Park where she worked in Hut 6 where staff were tasked with cracking German army and air force Enigma cyphers.


There are descriptions of the Home Guard: the Burford platoon at one stage had 120 members. Fire watchers, fire fighters and the police played their part: Burford had 33 volunteer Special Constables and eight sergeants (Special Sergeants?). Various units were billeted here, and later in the war the Americans set up a base at Barrington Park, while a war canteen was set up in Church House, later the Warwick Hall

Burford's Home Guard

Fear of invasion was such that the government set up the Home Guard (initially called Local Defence Volunteers). This was an unpaid armed citizen militla supporting the domestic forces of the army. Operational from 1940 to 1944, the Home Guard comprised more than 1.5 million local volunteers otherwise ineligible for military service, such as those who were too young, too old or medically unfit to join the regular armed services and those in reserved occupations. Excluding those already in the armed services, the civilian police or other civil defence volunteer organisations, approximately one in five men were Home Guard volunteers. Their primary role was to act as a secondary defence force in their local area in case of invasion.

The following text is from the Burford in the War of 1939-1945 book published by the Burford and Fulbrook Women's Institute in 1947:

In the early days of the LDV (Local Defence Volunteers) a Burford squad was formed, which, as the organisation improved, became the Burford platoon Home Guard, Captain L.E. Conway, an infantry



There is much else in the book, too much to mention here. It is generously illustrated with images on almost every page. Peter Martin and others from the Tolsey Museum team are to be congratulated on the enormous effort they must have made to research and compile this fascinating volume. *Gordon Elliot*

THE ARTS SOCIETY COTSWOLDS

Lecture on Wednesday 12 November
Rescuing Zeugma from the Floodwaters of the Euphrates



In Spring 2000 an archaeological drama began to unfold on the banks of the Euphrates river in Turkey, close to the border with Syria. A small team of French and Turkish archaeologists found a Roman city on the banks of the river, with mosaics and wall-paintings finer than those of Pompeii. However, just beside them was the almost completed Birecik Dam, and the Turks had begun to flood the great reservoir behind it, taking the city under water.

Louise Schofield is an archaeologist who was Curator of Greek Bronze Age and Geometric Antiquities at the British Museum from 1987-2000. Her book, The Mycenaeans, was co-published by the Getty Museum and the British Museum in 2007. She now writes, lectures and runs international archaeological projects - previously in south-eastern Turkey, Greece and Albania and currently in Ethiopia. And rather wonderfully she has just been appointed Visiting Professor of Archaeology at the American University of Rome.

THE HOLYROOD FAIR AND THE HOUSE OF YORK

There is a document in the Tolsey Museum which records the grant in 1497 by Henry VII of the right to hold an annual fair in Burford in September, for three days before and after the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (also known as Holyrood Day). In addition, the town was given the right to hold a 'Court of Pie Powder', a name which derives from the French pieds poudrés, meaning powdered feet, doubtless because some of those who visited the fair were travellers, with dust on their shoes.

This was only one of several fairs held in Burford, while the town had long enjoyed the right to hold a weekly market; but what was it that motivated Henry VII to grant the right to another fair in 1497? He has long been credited as the first king of England to have an economic policy, at least with regard to the larger towns; but the principal reason in this case was probably dynastic and political. Specifically, despite his victory at the Battle of Bosworth in 1484, Henry needed to curry favour with those who were still loyal to the House of York, rather than his own House of Lancaster, and he was in a good position to do so now because he had become lord of the manor of Burford in 1493.

The background is that during the Wars of the Roses Burford was apparently a centre of Yorkist loyalism. For example, the Great Almshouse was built in 1457 on land donated by Richard Neville, Earl of Warwick, lord of the manor between 1449 and 1471. He is known as 'the Kingmaker' because he supported the Yorkist claim to the throne, before he defected to Lancaster and was killed at the battle of Barnet in 1471. In addition, Lord Lovell of Minster Lovell became a prominent Yorkist courtier under Richard III (1483-5). Hence the popular rhyme, which referred to Richard's reign as a time when 'the Cat, the Rat and Lovell the Dog ruled all England under the Hog', the Cat being Sir William Catesby, the Rat being Sir Richard Ratcliffe, while the Dog appeared on Lord Francis Lovell's crest, and the Hog on the King 's badge.

There is some support in Mary Sturge Gretton's novel *Crumplin* for the view that Henry VII's grant of a fair to Burford was not just philanthropic,. This revolves around a Yorkist plot to overthrow Henry VII in 1491. Much of the action takes place in Burford, Upton, Swinbrook, Asthall and Minster Lovell and the story is of course fictional; but, in the author's note, she tells of an official record which shows that one William Brampton of Burford was indeed convicted of treason that year, and that the land which was then forfeit to the Crown included 'an inn called The George in the town of Burford on the Wolde'.

REPORT FROM OCC COUNCILLOR

Apply For Your Oxford Congestion Zone Permit

The cabinet at Oxfordshire County Council have approved plans for the new Oxford Congestion Zone. Some 7000 people responded to the consultation, with 74% of those stating that the congestion zone will have a negative impact on their lives. A separate petition presented to cabinet members calling for the congestion zone to be scrapped was signed by 13,000 people. Commencement of the zone will be 29 October; therefore, it is vital that residents apply for their permits now if they are planning on travelling within the zone.

Oxfordshire Alliance Councillors have continued to call for the unfair, anti-motorist charge to be scrapped by the Lib Dems. We believe that enforcing this charge, despite the clear views from the consultation, will mean that people shop elsewhere, leading to a negative effect on the economy in Oxford – especially this close to Christmas.

All Oxfordshire residents can apply for free 25 permits per year. The relevant information on how to apply for a permit is available from OCC's website under Transport and Travel/ Oxford's temporary congestion charge for cars.

Send Motion Rejected By Oxfordshire Lib-Dems

Due to increasing pressure on SEND services in Oxfordshire, a motion was submitted calling on the council leader to reinstate a dedicated cabinet member for SEND.

This motion was not controversial and was backed by Oxfordshire Alliance, Labour, Green and Reform Councillors. However, the Lib Dem led Council voted against this motion, meaning that the proposal for a cabinet member for specific SEND responsibility was rejected.

Shadow cabinet member for Children and Young People Cllr James Plumb said, "The decision to remove [the role] has weakened the council's focus at a time when greater leadership is needed, not less. We all know that there is no

quick fix to the issues surrounding SEND, but reinstating a dedicated cabinet member will help restore confidence. sharpen accountability and show families that this council is serious about delivering the change that families and children with SEND desperately deserve.' Cllr Nicholas Field-Johnson

Members met to hear expert Dr Michael Jones speak about the great plant hunter David Douglas (1799-1834). From humble beginnings in the village of Scone he rose, courtesy of elementary education paid for by his father's work on the rebuilding of Scone Castle, through apprenticeship (aged 11), being a trainee gardener at Glasgow Botanic Gardens, through hard work, to a distinguished yet short career as an international plant hunter. A protege of Professor William Hooker, he gained mentorship, access to lectures and an academic library in Glasgow, and elevation to become a plant hunter for the Horticultural Society of London, precursor to the Royal Horticultural Society of Chelsea Flower Show fame (and much more).

His three journeys to North America resulted in the arrival of over 200 plants common to our gardens today in the UK sunflowers, lupins, mahonia, penstemons, delphiniums, phlox, flowering red currant - and to our parks - Sitka Spruce, the income-generator for the Forestry Commission, grown in uniform monoculture in so many of our more remote mountainous areas, and the eponymous Douglas Fir. Unaware of the inadvisability of introducing non-native species, the societies and individuals supporting plant-hunting also caused environmental challenge: I've done battle with non-native snowberry in my time, and there are more serious economically worrying invasive species out there in forestry.

Scientific endeavour through plant collection was hazardous back then. He walked hundreds and hundreds of miles through uncharted territory, dodging unfriendly native Americans to reach known sites of potential interest. Cargoes of specimens were lost to sabotage, neglect and indeed shipwreck. The portable greenhouse (the Wardian Cabinet) was invented after Douglas's death.

Tiring of the exigencies of his job with the Horticultural Society of London, Douglas resigned his position during his third exploratory journey. A free man, he planned to walk from Oregon north, cross the Bering Strait, and to call upon the Tsar of Russia! Something made him abort that plan, but sadly, he fell victim to the trapping pit method of hunting, crashing through a layer of vegetation into a pit already containing a bullock, where he was gored to death, aged 35, in Hawaii.

Douglas is much feted in the USA, and less so here, though there is a handsome monument at Scone. Ruth Reavley

BURFORD SINGERS 2025-2026

The repertoire that the Burford Singers will embrace over the coming season has something for everyone, whether you prefer the clean lines of Mozart, the energy and glorious storylines of Handel, or the joys of Anglican Choral Music. In November, we focus on the classical era with music by Mozart and Marianna Martines. You've heard of one, but you might not have heard of Martines. She had an amazing start in life, living in a building which had an Esterhazy princess on the ground floor, and a young and struggling composer named Josef Haydn on the top floor. She took piano lessons from him, and eventually played piano duets with Mozart, 12 years her junior. Their music calms and sparkles in equal measure. Her Mass in D major forms the centrepiece of the programme and alongside it sits his Vespers (complete with the ubiquitous Laudate Dominum), the Adagio and Fugue for Strings, and his utterly radiant setting of Ave Verum Corpus.

Moving slightly earlier and reaching for our harpsichord and spell-checker, March's concert consists of one great masterpiece: GF Handel's Judas Maccabeus. A large-scale oratorio, the work is based around the fight for faith, a struggle which sadly still continues in the land where the piece is based almost 3000 years later. Musically, it has all the excellence that you might expect in baroque music, plangent melodies, rousing brass, and a few very familiar tunes – See the Conquering Hero comes is heard here to the tune now more commonly sung to the words 'Thine be the glory, risen conquering son'. I really believe it is on par with Messiah, so if you like that, you'll love this!

Then in June, we celebrate major anniversaries of three staples of the church music scene, the 50th anniversary of the death of Benjamin Britten, the 100th anniversary of the death of Irish composer, Charles Wood, and the 150th anniversary of the death of Samuel Sebastian Wesley. Each of the composers has a very distinct musical language, and despite Britten probably being best known for his operatic endeavours, each composed copious quantities of music for the Anglican choral tradition. Of the seven works that form the concert, we'll hear two works by Britten (the Te Deum in C and Rejoice in the Lamb), two works by Wesley (The Wilderness and Ascribe unto the Lord) and three contrasting works by Wood, including O Thou the Central Orb. This is all utterly glorious music, packed full of wonderful tunes and dramatic effect, along with moments of gentle repose. All in all, a great variety of music to mark the climax of the Burford

"CARMEN – A POCKET OPERA" – CARMEN & CO, NORTHLEACH CHURCH

"We hear a report that this church was originally built by hundreds of industrious sheep", says Carmen, introducing her company to us. Great interaction with the audience was one of their many gifts. First and foremost, the performance of Bizet's (and other) music, by two guitars, led by Carmen's flute or voice, was beautiful – played and sung with passion and precision. Carmen's telling of her own story had the same qualities, with the addition of lovely touches of wit, sometimes scripted, sometimes improvised. 70 NEW HOMES IN SHEEP STREET?

The HELAA Plan is now available on the West Oxfordshire website. Consultation opens in November. We are a group of Burford residents who got together to oppose the Sheep Street site, and we hope you will support us in stopping this ludicrous project by registering your comments and objections.

In October's Bridge, our District Councillor Hugo Ashton wrote about the HELAA plan that he put together with Councillor Andy Graham. Unfortunately, Hugo did not mention that on page 71 of the report, Area N, currently Prime Agricultural Land, was recommended for the development of 70 dwellings. Area N covers the fields on Sheep Street from the Surgery to the cemetery lane, land where Battle Edge was fought in 752AD and the historic importance of which is key to the area. Thanks to West Oxfordshire's focus on the view of A40 motorists, this entire area enjoyed by most residents is now going to be concreted over. You know the lovely walk through the fields which nicely allows people to loop from Tanners Lane back to Sheep Street and the High Street? Concrete!

On top of this, it is questionable whether the council has completed proper due diligence. After reading the site proposal, we decided to check a few facts.

Surgery and schools.

As of a few months ago, the Burford surgery was no longer accepting new patients. Due to the Cotswold Gate development, the surgery saw a 14% increase in the number of patients. In addition, as part of that development is considered a care home, the surgery is compelled to accept everyone from the retirement community. Politicians enjoy telling us that each new development financially contributes under section 106 which goes towards increasing capacity for local schools and surgery. As of today, the surgery has not seen a penny. 14% increase in patients, 0% increase in funds. Likewise, both the primary and secondary schools are now oversubscribed.

Flooding and water pollution.

Unlike Cotswold Gate which sits on a flat free-draining surface, Sheep Street is at the bottom of a steep hill with severe flooding after each heavy rainfall. Replacing fields with concrete requires very extensive (and expensive) structural measures to prevent the water running down and flooding the lands and properties north of the development site. For this reason, the Cole's Field development was judged unsuitable as it would have resulted in the flooding of Witney Street and of three properties. It should be noted that BTC was firmly against this development. In December 2022 they wrote:

BTC is as unanimously and robustly against this proposal as we have been against all previous applications. We regard it as a cynical attempt to batter Burford into submission knowing that we are a small community with limited resources. We shall, as your Council, be lodging strong objections

So, what changed? Did they conduct a flooding assessment we haven't seen? Have we now become a large community with abundant resources?

Traffic and air pollution.

Traffic in Burford is horrendous and getting worse with an increase in the number of coaches. The constant traffic in Burford has resulted in a significant increase in air pollution due to cars and coaches idling. Sheep Street and Tanners Lane should be considered single lane roads. The HELAA site plan proposes nothing less than adding roughly 150 cars on these

two streets. In addition, the planners considered that this would be a perfect place to add a coach and car park. We assume that the planners expect all cars and coaches to access the site from the west side of Sheep Street. With most traffic coming from Oxford, this is nothing but wishful thinking. With no direct access to the A40, the development site and coach and car parks will exacerbate traffic jams on Sheep Street and Tanners Lane and increase air pollution.

Public transport.

Whilst the planners emphasise the buses from Burford to Witney, they failed to flag that there is no coach service to the train station. They also fail to mention that Charlbury now has resident parking which results in no parking available at the train station after 8:15am. Therefore, unless you are planning on getting into Oxford before 8:30am, you can no longer take the train to go to Oxford.

Whilst the affordable housing will benefit teachers and people working in Burford, only 10% of the 70 dwellings are required to be affordable. Whilst politicians argue that this number is much higher, the House of Commons Library published a paper in July 2024 showing that this percentage has now fallen from 20% in 2020 to 16% in 2023. Therefore, in a development of 70 homes roughly 7 -11 families will be in affordable homes, and the rest (59 to 63 dwellings) will be expensive dwellings likely used as Airbnb properties or even left empty. Several Cotswold Gate properties are still vacant.

Please, when the consultation opens, make your views known. Without them, Burford faces an unmanageable spread which we cannot physically support.



We are a safe place for those who feel unsure and a friendly face for those who feel alone. The Madhatter bookshop offers the community a unique tangible experience that goes far beyond the simple transaction. We serve as a community hub, an aesthetic landmark that fosters a love of reading, of books and of conversation. We have a proven track record of events such as Burford Comedy Club, Imaginary Landscapes, and one of my dearest nights of the month, our book club. We are a cultural anchor in these turbulent times, and culturally the seas do not look like they are going to calm anytime soon. At our recent Burford Literary Festival, Professor Richard Ovenden, 25th Librarian of The Bodleian in Oxford and author of Burning The Books, emphasised that bookshops, independent ones in particular, are vital gateways to widespread and unbiased knowledge. ALICE'S BOOK GROUP

The Old Ways by Robert MacFarlane, Sep 2025

"May you live in interesting times" is an ancient Chinese blessing – or curse, and it was brought to mind by *The Old Ways* by Robert MacFarlane. This big book follows the author's travels along paths that have been in use for centuries. His adventures reach across continents and he includes sea passages that have been used from ancient times, often with eccentric or complex companions.

Even the person who recommended the book to Alice's Book Group had reservations, She and others felt that, whilst the chronicle of his often strenuous walks, which are various

including the Broomway, the second most dangerous path in Britain; in strife riven Palestine; the Caingorms and many a mountainous region, are beautiful with vivid description and even the occasional hint of humour, the overall result was an offering that was over-rich. One could only absorb so much at a time. MacFarlane unleashes a torrent of words, description, references to multiple literary sources and revelations, so the only way to



digest it is to take small bites. There is sometimes a mystical element to his journey. He professes that serious mountain hikers "walk into (not on) the mountain itself." Not everyone could finish the book, indeed there were those who found the whole book overwhelming and could not "get into it" at all.

Taken at a chapter a time, however, this could be described as a lovely and informative book. Even the most mundane is often given a charming twist, nor does MacFarlane take himself too seriously. In the middle of a most lyrical description of camping on a Scottish sea cliff, he records being observed by a soft eyed seal, he serenades it with a classical song, but exhausting his repertoire resorts to heavy metal singing "Stairway to Heaven" by Guns N' Roses, at which the seal "ducks it head three times as if rinsing its ears" and disappears. MacFarlane says "I felt embarrassed." It made me I laugh. Again, upon waking from a snooze on a Tibetan mountain, he is observed by an inquisitive vulture. He makes signs of active life: "I don't need help destroying my liver, I can do that myself." This is an example of the way in which the author can make the extraordinary, like snoozing on a Tibetan mountain, seem commonplace, and while on his walks he brings the landscape to life with his sometimes minute description, there is always some down-to-earth detail.

Next, having been "serious" for a while we will probably aim for something short and frivolous to read.

This includes help reducing energy bills, managing debt, understanding carbon monoxide risks and signing up to the free Priority Services Register (PSR), which offers extra help during power cuts and loss of gas supplies. As a palliative and bereavement support charity, the

partnership is particularly poignant. People at the end of their lives often rely on medical devices and need warm homes essentials that can lead a terminally ill person's energy bill to rise by 75% after their diagnosis.

As we enter the colder months, now is the time to check on ourselves and those around us because no one should face hardship today or in their final days.

PINEWOOD SCHOOL

Learning Outside: Making the Most of Every Season

As November arrives with its shorter days and cooler temperatures, there's a tendency to assume children's outdoor time naturally diminishes. Yet some schools are finding the opposite, with autumn and winter offering distinct learning opportunities precisely because of the season's challenges and

At Pinewood School on the Oxfordshire-Wiltshire border, outdoor education runs year-round across 84 acres of grounds. The approach at Pinewood integrates outdoor learning throughout the curriculum rather than treating it as separate. Pre-Prep children work in the Squirrel Classroom, complete with

mud kitchen, fire pit, and greenhouses, regardless of season. Children in Lower School enjoy Stone Age days, where pupils craft weapons as ancient people did before gathering for hot chocolate and campfire stories.

The school's Victorian walled kitchen garden keeps children connected to growing cycles even in colder months. In the 30-foot polytunnel and raised



beds, pupils grow seasonal produce that makes its way to the school kitchen. For boarders, the grounds take on different character at dusk, offering evening exploration that day pupils rarely experience.

Physical challenges can reveal different strengths to classrooms. Pinewood's Rubber Legs Challenge, a tough-mudder style course with teams navigating obstacles, mud and water, is contested through House competition. Children who find confidence outside formal lessons often flourish here, while strong academic performers discover new capabilities through teamwork under pressure.

Born Free - fighting the cause on behalf of all wild animals!

We are delighted to welcome Born Free, international wildlife charity, to speak at our 2026 festival and share their mission and their stories.

Founded by the stars who featured in the classic 1966 film of the same name, Born Free charity works tirelessly to protect and help save wild animals from ill treatment, exploitation and extinction.

Actors Virginia McKenna DBE and Bill Travers MBE together with their son, Will Travers OBE, set up the charity in 1984, campaigning for a future where humans and animals can coexist safely and in harmony.

Mirroring the story told in the original film where conservationists, Joy and George Adamson (played by Virginia and Bill), rescued a lioness cub and eventually released her back into the wild, Bill and Virginia tried in vain to save a baby elephant, Pole Pole, whom they had worked with as part of another wildlife film; subsequently, the elephant had been gifted to London Zoo for a life in captivity. This spurred them on to petition for the freedom of Pole Pole, leading to their setting up of the Born Free foundation, which has grown and flourished into the international charity it is today.

Born Free works with schools and communities across the UK, Kenya, Ethiopia and South Africa to educate and engage with locals with the aim of encouraging a love of wildlife and the passion to protect it.



It has been a year since we lost Peter who was a well known face of Burford. He came to Burford in 1970 and spent 25 years working for Frank Williams Antiques where he lived above the shop. He then spent the next 27 years living in College Cottage just next door on the High Street, before health issues saw him move to Burford Home at Whitehill where he was so warmly welcomed and he thoroughly enjoyed his last years living there. He was born in Moretonin-Marsh hospital and spent his childhood years in Long Compton, Asthall and then Swinbrook. He went to Reading University where he studied Geography, then onto his National Service which was served in Akrotiri in Cyprus. On his return to civilian life he had various jobs which took him to Bournemouth, the Isle of Wight then back to Oxfordshire. He enjoyed going to the Opera and amateur dramatics and he was a member of the Open the Book team which acted out Bible stories at the Primary School (he loved performing). He was a regular volunteer at the Tolsey Museum, Chairman of the Burford Branch of the Royal British Legion, a regular church member, a Church PCC member, an active member of the Friends of Burford Church of which he was chairman for a number of years, a Churchwarden then later Verger to name but a few! He relished his job as Verger and loved telling the stories and history of Burford Church to what must have amounted to thousands of visitors over the years. He was made a founder member of the Fellowship of St Birinus by Bishop Colin Fletcher of Dorchester for his dedication to Burford Church.

After his retirement he spent his time walking, visiting his sister and brother-in-law, whizzing around the countryside in his little car and took the opportunity to travel by train whenever he could. His ashes have been buried on his parents grave, next to his sister and brother in law in the churchyard in Swinbrook.

PLANNING AHEAD

Is now the time to start thinking "Home Improvements"?

Autumn is the perfect time to start planning ahead for your proposed building project, be it a modest house extension or even a new-build project. This might sound counterintuitive, but if you start now you may well be able to commence construction in the spring. The process is explained below.

Working with Panton Design will provide various design options that you may not have considered, and it is worth spending time getting this exciting stage right. Initial design sketches will be developed to an agreed final scheme for Planning Permission and construction purposes.

Not all building designs require Planning Permission and we will guide you through this process as the design may fall within the category of "Permitted Development" where formal Permission is not necessary.

A simple and cost-effective means of determining whether Permission is required and whether the Planners would support the proposals is to apply for what is called "Pre-Application Advice" with the Local Authority. This is normally dealt with within 21 days, although it can take longer. Applications for Planning Permission can take eight weeks.

Once this has been determined, Panton Design will prepare the construction drawings. This will allow us to submit for Building Regulations approval, again with the Local Authority, which can take them up to five weeks. Simultaneously, we will approach recommended building contractors for their quotations.

By default good builders are generally busy but it is advisable to work with the correct team.

As you can see, the process could take a minimum of 13 weeks (around three months) just for the Local Authority approvals. This doesn't include time for design and appointing a builder, so it may take up to five months from the initial decision to improve your home to actually starting building work. The timeframe will be project specific but this should provide you with a realistic guide.

Cotswold Wildlife Park celebrates a record-breaking breeding season and becomes the only zoological collection in the UK to breed "Critically Endangered" Greater Bamboo Lemurs this year.

Not only has 2025 been a record-breaking year for visitor numbers, but it has also been the most successful breeding season on record for one of the collection's rarest species – the "Critically Endangered" Greater Bamboo Lemur. Recently, the Primate Team celebrated the arrival of four Greater Bamboo Lemur babies. Births in captivity are extremely rare. In fact, the Park is the only zoological collection in the UK and one of three worldwide to have bred these rare primates this year. With a population of 13, Cotswold Wildlife Park is now home to the biggest breeding group in the world. In the wild, there are fewer Greater Bamboo Lemurs left than higher profile species such as Black Rhino, Tiger and Giant Panda.

Four by four: The UK's only Greater Bamboo Lemur births join an impressive baby boom at the Park (over 523 births so far this year). Other new arrivals include:

Four Great Grey Owl chicks - first brood from the Park's breeding pair.

Four rare Humboldt Penguin chicks, classified as "Vulnerable" on the IUCN's Red List of Endangered Species. This year was the Park's most successful Penguin breeding season in ten years. One in particular, Pippin, caught the attention of visitors due to her special bond with Keeper Laura (who hand-reared the chick after she was abandoned in the nest box).

Four Yellow Mongoose pups have also joined the collection. *Debbie Ryan*

REPORT FROM WODC COUNCILLOR

On 3 November the District will have published our Preferred Spatial Options Consultation Paper and launched the consultation which will run to just before Christmas.

The Spatial Options Paper sets out a change in the Spatial Strategy which responds to feedback from our consultation on the Policy Options and splits the Villages Tier 3 into two levels. If adopted, Tier3 would contain larger, more sustainable villages and Tier 4 would consist of medium size and less sustainable villages. Apart from specific allocations made in the local plan, the proposal is that in Tier 3 village developments above 50 houses would not be supported, and in Tier 4 villages developments above 10 houses would not be supported. This would give some measure of protection from speculative proposals once the plan has been adopted.

The consultation paper then outlines preferred areas for development to fulfil the Government requirements of 905 homes annually. This would result in a 30% increase in the District's housing stock by 2043 (the end date of the emerging plan). In the main these are planned to be concentrated in strategic sites around Witney, the Carterton area and Chipping Norton. Smaller allocations have been made to service centres and villages totalling around 800 homes. This includes an allocation of 70 houses to Burford in the lower part of the field beyond the surgery in Sheep Street. The aim is for this site to be used to build smaller starter homes and homes suitable for down-sizing, as well as a space for some muchneeded car parking to support the town's visitor economy.

Several other draft documents are published at the same time as background to the Spatial Options Paper. These include the Settlement Sustainability Report which outlines how the village sustainability has been assessed, the Infrastructure Delivery Plan Baseline report which is the starting point for assessing the infrastructure necessary to support the housing growth and the HELAA (Housing and Employment Land Availability Assessment), which is our planners' view of the 250+ sites that came forward in the District's call-for-sites in late 2023.

Please look at the consultation and comment on the sites where you have knowledge, whether it is to support the assessment or to raise concerns, for example if you believe an issue with the site has been overlooked or understated.

Please look out for one other area for consultation which should be published during late October or November. This is a District proposal that the near part of the Guildenford car park be reserved for short term parking of up to 4 hours. Parking for longer would be restricted to

the further part of car park.
I am sure that many readers will have much to say on both these topics!

TREASURES OF BURFORD **CHURCH**

The Flanders Cross in the Chapel of the Holy **Spirit**

Wooden crosses on temporary graves were a common sight on the battlefields of Flanders and the Western Front during the First World War. After the war, these crosses were largely replaced by the permanent headstones now maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC).

Family members were given the option of receiving their loved one's original wooden cross. Many relatives took possession of these treasured artefacts and some can still be seen today in churches or memorial buildings. Other unclaimed crosses were burned, and the ashes were scattered over the permanent cemeteries.

This wooden cross in the Chapel of the Holy Spirit marked the first grave, near Ypres in Belgium, of Major A S Conway D S O (1906 -1917) 1st Battalion the North Staffordshire Regiment (The Prince of Wales's) who was killed on 17 June 1917. A full account of his army career and connection with Burford is available beside the cross.

Although we have names inscribed on war memorials it is good to have this plain cross from an actual First World War battlefield commemorating the life of a brave man given for his country.




